
Bench rules that the former Delhi Deputy CM's right to a speedy trial and prolonged incarceration make him eligible for bail: it declines plea to bar him from Secretariat, says he has 'deep roots in society' and there is no possibility of him fleeing

# Supreme Court grants Sisodia bail in Delhi excise policy case

Bench rules that the former Delhi Deputy CM's right to a speedy trial and prolonged incarceration make him eligible for bail; it declines plea to bar him from Secretariat, says he has 'deep roots in society' and there is no possibility of him fleeing

he Supreme Court on Friday stressed to the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) and the Directorate of Enforcement (ED) that "every day counts in matters of personal liberty" while granting bail to former Delhi Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia, who spent over 17 months behind

bars without trial for mo-

ney laundering charges linked to the Delhi excise

policy.

A Bench of Justices B.R. Gavai and K.V. Viswanathan said the right to a speedy trial and personal liberty were sacrosanct. Bail cannot be withheld as a punishment. If the state, prosecution agencies or even courts do not have the wherewithal to protect an accused's right to a speedy trial, they should not withhold bail on the ground that the alleged crime was serious.

The top court allowed bail to Mr. Sisodia in both ED and CBI cases and ordered him to be released on payment of ₹10 lakh in

Justice Gavai expressly declined an oral plea made by the ED/CBI to bar Mr. Sisodia from the Delhi Secretariat. The court said Mr. Sisodia had "deep roots in the society" and there was no possibility of him trying to flee or tamper with evidence or influence witnesses.

"Keeping Mr. Sisodia in-

carcerated for an unlimited time in the hope of a speedy trial is a violation of his fundamental right to liberty under Article 21 of the Constitution," Justice Gavai, who authored the verdict, observed.

## **Prolonged trial**

The court said there was not even the "remotest possibility" of the trial concluding in the near future. The prosecution has 493 witnesses lined up. There were over a lakh pages of documents involved in the case.

"As observed time and again, prolonged incarceration before being pronounced guilty of an offence cannot be permitted to become punishment without bail," Justice Gavai noted.

The Bench said the Supreme Court was flooded with "open-and-shut" bail cases rejected by the trial and High Courts. The principle that 'bail is the rule and jail an exception' is being followed in breach.

Mr. Sisodia had undergone two earlier rounds of litigation for bail. The first round ended on October 30 last year with the top court denying him interim bail while upholding his right to speedy trial.

The probe agencies had assured the top court to conclude the trial in the next six to eight months. The second round culminated on June 4, 2024, again in the Supreme Court. Mr. Sisodia was denied interim bail but was allowed to "revive" his plea as soon as the final chargesheet was filed.

Rejecting the agencies' contention that Mr. Sisodia should seek his bail first in the trial court rather than directly approach the top court, Justice Gavai, on Friday, said the grant of bail was not a "snake-and-ladder game" and it would be a "travesty of justice" to relegate the bail plea to the trial court. "Procedure is the handmaid of justice not the mistress of justice," the court highlighted.

# **Bail Granted:**

The Supreme Court of India granted bail to former Delhi Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia in the Delhi excise policy case. Sisodia had been in jail for over 17 months without trial on money laundering charges.

The Court emphasized the importance of a speedy trial and personal liberty, stating that prolonged incarceration before being proven guilty is a violation of fundamental rights.

# Conditions and Observations:

- Sisodia is required to surrender his passport and report to the police station every Monday.
- The Court noted that Sisodia has "deep roots in society" and there is no possibility of him fleeing or tampering with evidence.
- The plea by the CBI and ED to bar Sisodia from entering the Secretariat was declined.

# Trial Concerns:

- The Supreme Court highlighted the slow progress of the trial, noting that the prosecution has listed 493 witnesses.
- The Court stressed that bail is a rule and jail an exception, and criticized the lower courts for denying Sisodia's bail earlier.

# Revival of Principle:

- The Supreme Court's judgment granting bail to former Delhi Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia reaffirmed the long-standing principle that "bail is the rule, jail is the exception," even in cases involving economic offences.
- This principle, first articulated by Justice Krishna Iyer in 1977, was highlighted as often being overlooked by trial courts and High Courts.

# Criticism of Current Practice:

- The Court criticized lower courts for preferring to "play safe" by denying bail, even in clear-cut cases, and called for the judiciary to recognize that the refusal of bail should be the exception, not the rule.
- The Supreme Court emphasized that detention should not become a form of punishment before the accused is proven guilty.

# Economic Offences:

- The Court acknowledged that while economic offences are serious, denying bail should not be a blanket rule. Each case should be considered on its own merits, and the primary focus should be on securing the accused's presence for trial.
- The judgment reiterated that the denial of bail should be an exception, even when the allegations involve grave economic offences.

The Supreme Court judg-ment granting bail to former Delhi Deputy Chief Mi-nister Manish Sisodia revived a well-settled but endangered principle that "jail and not bail is the ex-

"jail and not bail is the ex-ception", even in econom-ic offence cases.

The adage "bail, not jail, is the rule" came from the properties of the properties of the 1977.

On Friday, a Bench of Justices B.R. Gaval and K.V. Viswanathan did not mince words while saying that High Codures and trial that the properties of the proper "play safe" and deny bail even if the case is an open-and-shut one. "From our experience,

we can say that it appears that the trial courts and the High Courts attempt to play safe in matters of grant of bail... The princi-ple that bail is a rule and pie that ball is a rule and refusal is an exception is, at times, followed in breach... It is high time trial courts and the High Courts recogand the High Courts recog-nised once again the prin-ciple that 'bail is the rule and jail is the exception'," Justice Gavai, who auth-ored the 38-page verdict, observed.

# India to roll out new treatment regimen for drug-resistant TB



ndia is getting ready to roll out the BPaL (bedaquiline, pretomanid, and linezolid) regimen for all multidrug resistant tuberculosis (MDR-TB) and extensively drug-resistant tuberculosis (XDR-TB) patients. The training for this new exercise is scheduled to begin this month.

This is a significant move in the country's battle against M/XDR-TB, with the new drug regimen indicating good results in countries such as Pakistan, South Africa, and Ukraine.

Announcing this on social media on Friday, Soumya Swaminathan, principal adviser, National Tuberculosis Elimination Programme, said, "India is getting ready to roll out BPaL regimen for all M/ XDRTB patients – training to begin this month. This should improve treatment outcomes & help thousands of patients. Scaling up NAAT coverage will be an essential element of the strategy."

A nucleic acid amplification test, or NAAT, for tuberculosis (TB) is a molecu-



lar test used to detect the DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) of Mycobacterium tuberculosis complex (MTBC) in a sputum or other respiratory sample.

Welcoming the announcement, Leena Menghaney, South Asia head of humanitarian organisation Médecins Sans Frontières, said: "After the availability of generic bedaquiline cost to TB programmes has fallen -BPaLM price is \$426 (\$130 bedaquiline, \$238 pretomanid, \$31 linezolid and \$27 moxifloxacin). This is a momentous day for people with drug-resistant tuberculosis, because India will finally replace many of the longer, arduous, and less effective treatments by offering better, safer, and shorter BPaLM treatment that is much more likely to cure this deadly disease."

A senior Health Ministry official explained that after the introduction of the new anti-TB drug pretomanid, which is prescribed as part of the BPaL regimen, medical practitioners and researchers noted that the combination drastically cut short the TB treatment duration by half.

From a treatment duration range of 18 to 24 months, BPaL brings down treatment time to around six months. Furthermore, the older all-oral drug regimen included nearly 14 different anti-TB drugs for a patient to take every day. With BPaL, it is likely to

come down to just three tablets daily.

In a paper titled "Savings from the introduction of BPaL and BPaLM regimens at the country level" published last month, the authors noted that in 2022, the World Health Organization recommended the sixmonth regimens BPaL (bedaquiline + pretomanid + linezolid) and BPaLM (BPaL + moxifloxacin) as treatment options for most forms of drug-resistant TB.

The study found that through the BPaL and BPaLM regimens, drug-resistant TB treatment has become more effective, shorter, less burdensome for patients, and cheaper for both health systems and patients.







- Solar Power: Back in March 2014, Solar power generation was 2.82 GW, and it is around 85.47 GW of solar power in June 2024. That's nearly 30 times the original capacity.
  - India achieved 4th position globally in RE (Renewable Energy)
     Installed Capacity.
- Wind Power: Wind turbines have been spinning their way to success too. It has surged from 21.04 GW to a breezy 46.66 GW in the same period.
  - India achieved 5th position globally in it.

- For the first time ever, India has surpassed the 200 GW mark from non-fossil fuel sources. It includes:
  - 85.47 GW of solar power
  - 46.93 GW of large hydro
  - 46.66 GW of wind power
  - 10.95 GW of biopower
  - 5.00 GW of small hydropower

#### Budget and Tariff

- The budgetary allocation for the Ministry of Renewable Energy has doubled from Rs10,000 crores last year to more than Rs20,000 crores this year.
- Solar power tariffs have gone from Rs. 10.95 per unit in 2010-11 to a mere Rs. 2.60 in 2023-24.

#### India Towards a Greener Future

- India aims to reach a non-fossil fuel energy capacity of 500 GW by 2030 and fulfil at least half of its energy requirements via renewable energy by 2030 at the COP26.
- To achieve this ambitious target, the MNRE is targeting the bidding of around 50 GW of renewable energy projects per annum.

- It is a significant increase from the previous target of 450 GW.
  - The plan involves an investment of at least ₹2.44 lakh crore or ₹2.44 trillion.
  - India's renewable energy sector has the potential to employ around one million people by 2030, and most of the new jobs would be generated by small-scale renewable energy projects.

- Government Efforts in India's Renewable Energy Sector
- Permitting FDI: India has permitted FDI up to 100% under the automatic route to attract foreign investments.
- Waiver of Inter State Transmission System (ISTS)
   charges: For inter-state sale of solar and wind power for projects, ISTS charges have been waived off.

- Moreover, the day serves as a call to action for governments, organizations, and individuals to uphold the rights of indigenous peoples, promote their empowerment, and work towards achieving justice, equality, and reconciliation.

#### About the Indigenous Peoples

- Indigenous Peoples are inheritors and practitioners of unique cultures and ways of relating to people and the environment.
- They reside in remote forests rich in natural resources in Bolivia, Brazil, Colombia, Ecuador, India, Indonesia, Papua New Guinea, Peru and Venezuela.

Lower Coffee Production in India



- The Coffee Board of India hinted that coffee production for 2024-25 may be significantly lower.
  - There has been a considerable loss of plants and berries on account of high temperature, heavy rainfall and landslides in the Wayanad.



- Coffee Production in India
- India became the world's eighth largest coffee grower during 2022-2023.
- Indian coffee is one of the best coffees in the world owing to its high quality and pertains to being premium in the international markets. India produces two types of coffee: Arabica and Robusta.
- Karnataka accounts for 70% of the country's total coffee production, while Kerala is the second-largest producer with a contribution of 23%.

- Tamil Nadu is the third-largest producer with 5% of India's total coffee production.
- Climatic Conditions: Coffee plants thrive in temperatures ranging from 15°C to 24°C. Extreme temperatures outside this range can adversely affect growth and yield.
  - India cultivates all of its coffee under a well-defined two-tier mixed shade canopy, comprising evergreen leguminous trees.

#### Coffee Board of India

- Government of India established the 'Coffee Board' through a constitutional act "Coffee Act VII of 1942" under the administrative control of the Ministry of Commerce and Industry.
- The Board comprises 33 members including the Chairman and the Secretary & Chief Executive Officer.
- It is an organisation that promotes coffee production in India.

## Lake Turkana




- A <u>comprehensive survey of Lake Turkana</u>, Africa's fourth-<u>largest lake</u>, has been conducted <u>for the first time in 50</u> <u>years</u>, revealing high fish potential.
- Led by UNESCO and the World Food Programme, and funded by the Dutch Government, the 10-year project aims to enhance the economic well-being and food security of the region's population.

- Lake Turkana is the largest desert lake in the world and is known for its unique greenish-blue colour.
- It is part of the <u>Omo-Turkana basin</u>, which stretches into <u>four</u> <u>countries: Ethiopia, Kenya, South Sudan and Uganda</u>
