How do emergency provisions impact Centre-State relations?

What is the federal structure of governance in India? How do Articles 355 and 356 affect federalism?

The story so far:

he recent spate of renewed

What is our federal set-up? India is a federation with governments at the Centre and the States. The Seventh Schedule to the Indian Constitution distributes the power between the Union and States. Under this scheme, it is the maintain law and order in their respective

What are emergency provisions?
The emergency provisions are provided in Part XVIII of the Constitution. Articles 3SS and 3S6 deal primarily with the affairs of government in a State under this part. Article 33S imposes a duty on the Centre to protect every State from external aggression and internal disturbance. It

also specifies that the Centre should ensure that every State government operate according to the Constitution. Article 356 allows for the imposition of the President's rule if a State's government cannot function in accordance with constitutional provisions. While in the U.S. and Australia, federal government functions also involve protecting States, their constitutions do not contain provisions

for removing State governments. B.R. Ambedkar explained the purpose of Article 355, keeping in mind the federal character of our polity, that if the Centre is to interfere in the State's administration under Article 356, it must be by or under under Article 356, it must be by or under some obligation which the Constitution imposes on the Centre. Hence, Article 355 was incorporated to check any arbitrary or unauthorised use of Article 356.

What have the courts ruled?
Dr. Ambedkar again in the constituent
Assembly wished that Articles 355 and
356 would never be called into operation
and would remain a dead letter. However,
it was a travesty of the Constitutional

principles and federalism that Article 356 principles and tederalism that Article 356 was misused on several occasions removing elected governments that enjoyed majority in the States. The police allegedly de-molished the minarets of a 40-year-old worship place of the minority Ahmadi community in Pakistan's Punjab province, the Ja-maat-e-Ahmadiyya Pakis-tan said on Monday.

The incident took place in Okara, Depalpur, about 130 kilometres from

130 kilometres from Lahore. Jamaat-e-Ahmadiyya Pa-kistan (JAP) official Amir Mahmood said on Monday that over a dozen police-men of the Punjab police demolished the minarets at the Ahmadi worship place in Subhan Shah.

Last year, at least 42 worship places of the minority group in Pakistan had come under attack

"Under the supervision of the DSP, two police mo-biles arrived from the Depalpur Police Station, raid-ed the Ahmadi worship place and demolished the place and demolished the minaress after cordoning off the area," he said and added that this worship place was constructed be-fore 1984. Tariq Saleem Sheikh of the Lahore High Gourt last year made it clear in his decision that

the structures of the Ahma-di worship places built be-fore 1984 need no amend-ment. The police on the other hand said that they demolished the minarets after the local Ahmadis refused to do so.
"We received a com-

plaint against the minarets of Ahmadi worship place in Depalpur. We had sum-moned the local Ahmadis and asked them to demol-ish the minarets as they are identical to Muslim mos-ques. Taliban have called off polio vaccination campaigns, says UN

DUBAI

The Taliban have suspended polio vaccination campaigns in Afghanistan, the UN said on Monday. It's a devastating setback for polio eradication, since the virus is one of the world's most infectious and any unvaccinated groups of children where the virus is spreading could undo years of progress.

Afghanistan is one of two countries in which the spread of the potentially fatal, paralysing disease has never been stopped. The other is Pakistan. The Taliban's decision will likely have major repercussions for other countries in the region and beyond. News of the suspension was relayed to UN agencies right before the September immunisation campaign was due to start. No reason was given for the suspension, and no one from the Taliban-controlled government was immediately available for comment.

A top official from the World Health Organization said it was aware of discussions to move away from house-to-house vaccinations and instead have immunizations in places like mosques.

The WHO has confirmed 18 polio cases in Afghanistan this year, all but two in the south of the country. That's up from six cases in 2023.

"The Global Polio Eradication Initiative is aware of the recent policy discussions on shifting from house-to-house polio vaccination campaigns to site-to-site vaccination in parts of Afghanistan," said Dr. Hamid Jafari from the WHO. "Partners are in the process of discussing and understanding the scope and impact of any change in current policy."

Polio campaigns in neighboring Pakistan are regularly marred by violence. Militants target vaccination teams and police assigned to protect them, falsely claiming that the campaigns are a Western conspiracy to sterilize children.

As recently as August, the WHO reported that Afghanistan and Pakistan were continuing to implement an "intensive and synchronized campaign" focusing on improved vaccination coverage in endemic zones and an effective and timely response to detections elsewhere.



127th Anniversary of the Battle of Saragarhi

- Recently, the 127th anniversary of the Battle of Saragarhi was observed on 12th September 2024.
- It is one of the greatest final defences in world military history. On 12th September 1897, 21 soldiers and a noncombatant (named Daad who did menial works) of the 36th Sikh Regiment (now 4th Sikh) fought against over 8,000 Afridi and Orakzai tribal militants in the North West Frontier Province (NWFP), now in Pakistan.









 The soldiers, led by Havildar Ishar Singh, fought valiantly for seven hours, killing 200 militants and injuring 600 others.

•

Strategic Importance of Saragarhi:

Saragarhi was a communication tower located between Fort Lockhart and Fort Gulistan, two critical British forts in the NWFP., originally built by Maharaja Ranjit Singh and later renamed by the British.

Losing this post meant isolating the forts, thereby making British troops and the families of British officers vulnerable to attack.

- Honours for the Martyrs:
- Queen Victoria awarded the 21 dead soldiers the Indian Order of Merit (comparable with the Victoria Cross) for their bravery.
 - The British built an obelisk using burnt bricks from Saragarhi to honour the martyrs.
 - In 2017, the Punjab government declared 12th September as **Saragarhi Day**, a holiday to honour the sacrifice of the soldiers.
 - The Khyber Scouts regiment of the Pakistani army continues to honour the Saragarhi martyrs with a guard and salute at the memorial near Fort Lockhart.

Hindi Diwas 2024



India celebrated Hindi Diwas on 14th September 2024, marking the 75th anniversary of Hindi's adoption as the official language of the country.



The Union Minister for Home Affairs and Cooperation released a commemorative postage stamp to mark the completion of 75 years of Hindi as an official language.

- On 14th September 1949, the Constituent Assembly designated Hindi in Devanagari script as the official language of the Union of India.
- The Munshi-Ayyangar formula, a compromise between K M Munshi and N Gopalaswamy Ayyangar, resulted in Article 343 of the Constitution adopting Hindi in the Devanagari script as the official language of the Union, while allowing English to continue for official purposes for fifteen years.

- Articles Related to Hindi:
- Article 210 states that the language to be used in the legislature can be the official language of the state, Hindi, or English.
- Article 351 states that it shall be the duty of the Union to promote the spread of the Hindi language, to develop it so that it may serve as a medium of expression for all the elements of the composite culture of India.

A giant among 121 languages CHARTTI GROWTH OF HINDI AS MOTHER TONGUE (% OF POPULATION)




CHART2 MOTHER TONGUES BY SPEAKERS, 2011 Minimum 1 cr



