## BJP-led alliances as winners in Maharashtra, Jharkhand

Several exit polls on Wed-nesday gave a clear edge to the BJP-led alliances in the Assembly elections in Mah-arashtra and Jharkhand, while some projected that the Opposition Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA) coalition Maharashtra. Maharashtra.

In the 288-member Maharashtra Assembly, 145 is the majority mark, while t is 41 in the 81-member harkhand Assembly. The BJP-Shiv Sena-Nationalist Congress Party alliance is in power in Maharashtra, while the Jharkhand Mukti Morcha-Congress is ruling in Iharkhand. In Maharashtra the P.

In Maharashtra, the P-Marq exit polls predicted 137-157 seats, with 42% vote share, for the ruling Ma-hayuti alliance and 126-146 seats, with 41% vote share,

## Planetary crisis puts children at risk: UNICEF report

NEW DELHI

The world is facing an unprecedented planetary crisis with nearly half the world's children – about one billion – living in countries that face high risk of climate and environmental hazards, said the UNICEF's State of the World's Children 2024 (SOWC-2024) report, released on Wednesday.


The report examines impact of three long-term global forces – demographic shifts, climate and environmental crises, and frontier technologies – which it claims will have a profound effect on children's lives between now and 2050.

The report notes that climate destabilisation, biodiversity collapse and widespread pollution threats are intensifying globally.

Explaining the adverse impact, UNICEF said that children's developing bodies are uniquely susceptible to these hazards.

From before their first breath, children's brains, lungs and immune systems are vulnerable to pollution and extreme weather. Air pollution is especially harmful to children; its impact on their respiratory health and development can last a lifetime.

Rising temperatures increase mosquito populations, spreading diseases such as malaria, dengue and Zika. Floods contaminate water supplies, leading to waterborne diseases, which are a major cause of death for children under

five years of age. Extreme weather limits food production and access, increasing children's risk of food insecurity. Climate-related disasters can also cause feelings of helplessness, trauma and anxiety in children, the report notes.

"Since 2022, 400 million students around the world have experienced school closures due to ex-

"These regions already struggle to meet children's basic needs, while also facing significant climate risks and lacking adequate digital infrastructure," says the report adding that with fewer young dependents relative to workers, more resources could be freed to support children and boost the economy.

On frontier technologies, the report notes that artificial intelligence, neurotechnology, next-generation renewable energy and vaccine breakthroughs could significantly improve childhood in the future.

"Digitalisation can empower children but it can also expose children to online risks, including sexual exploitation and abuse," the report cautions.

It adds that over 95% of people in high-income countries are connected to the Internet, compared with barely 26% in low-income countries. Infrastructure limitations, high costs and permission barriers continue to impede progress. This digital exclusion threatens to exacerbate existing inequalities, especially in regions with rapidly growing child populations.

## Modi first Indian PM to visit Guyana in 56 years, signs 10 pacts to expand ties

NEW DELHI, NOVEMBER 20

INDIA AND Guyana on Wednesday sealed 10 agreements to strengthen cooperation in hydrocarbons, digital payment systems, pharmaceuticals, and defence after bilateral talks between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Guyanese President Mohamed Irfaan Ali.

Modi said Guyana will play an important role in India's energy security and a blueprint for long-term partnership in the sector will be prepared. "The visit of an Indian Prime Minister to Guyana after 56 years is an important milestone in our relations. I have had a deep personal bond with Guyana," he said while recalling his visit to the South American country about 24 years back.

The PM arrived last night from Brazil's Rio de Janeiro, where he attended the G20 summit. One of the MoUs will allow the deployment of India's UPI (Unified Payments Interface) digital payments system in Guyana. "We will continue to make efforts to increase our mutual trade and economic cooperation," Modi said.

Modi said India will continue to contribute to the capacity

building of Guyana's military through scholarships and training. "Close cooperation in the field of defence is a symbol of our deep mutual trust. I am happy that this year India has supplied two Dornier aircraft to Guyana."

Agreeing to expand cooperation in the agriculture sector, Modi said: "With the millet seeds provided by India last year, we were able to contribute to increasing the food security of Guyana..." India also agreed to set up a Jan Ausadhi Kendra in Guyana.

The two leaders also deliberated on regional and global issues. President Ali said Modi's visit to Guyana represents a significant milestone in enhancing cooperation between the two nations. He called Prime Minister Modi a "champion among leaders" for his impactful leadership and contribution to the developing world.

"Thank you very much... It is our greatest honour to have you here," Ali said during a joint press statement with Modi. He lauded Modi's governance style, noting its relevance and adoption in Guyana and other nations.

"You have shown the light to the developing world, and you have created development metrics and a framework that many are adopting in their own country. And much of it is relevant to us here in Guyana," he said.

## Modi First Indian PM to Visit Guyana in 56 Years, Signs 10 Pacts to Expand Ties

# India, Australia agree on tie-up in clean energy, push for trade pact

Will continue to support peace, stability in Indo-Pacific region together: PM

INDIA AND Australia agreed on an ambitious renewable energy partnership and looked forward to working towards a comprehensive economic cooperation agreement as PM Narendra Modi and his Australian counterpart Anthony Albanese met on the sidelines of the G20 leaders' Summit in Brazil.

Strengthening ties in areas of defence and security, mobility, science and technology and education figured prominently during the second India-Australia annual conclave held late Tuesday. The two leaders also looked forward to a long-term vision of defence and security collaboration to enhance collective strength, contribute to both countries' security, and make an important contribution to regional peace and security, according to a joint statement.

The two PMs welcomed the launch of the Renewable Energy Partnership (REP) which would provide the framework for practical cooperation in priority areas such as solar energy, green hydrogen, energy storage, investments in related projects and allied areas, it said.

In his media statement after the Summit talks with Albanese, Modi said both sides will work on new possibilities of cooperation in areas like defence industry, critical minerals, renewable energy, ship building, space and sports.

With both sides keen to build on the momentum created by the Economic Cooperation and Trade Agreement (ECTA), which was signed in 2022, the two PMs welcomed further work towards an "ambitious, balanced and mutually beneficial" Comprehensive Economic Cooperation Agreement (CECA) to realise the full potential of the bilateral economic relationship, the joint state-

ment said.

Modi said work will be done for a mutually beneficial CECA and that Albanese committed to protect the interests of the Indian community in Australia, especially Indian students. After the implementation of ECTA, our mutual trade has increased by 40% in the last two years, he said.

Modi also emphasised the need to resolve conflicts and tensions through dialogue and diplomacy. "We have been and will continue to support peace, stability and prosperity in the Indo-Pacific region together," he said.

The joint statement said that they expressed intent to "renew and strengthen the Joint Declaration on Defence and Security Cooperation in 2025, to reflect ambition in both countries' elevated defence and security partnership and strategic convergence".

Modi said both India and Australia are also unanimous on the need for reform in global institutions. Modi said Albanese has accepted his invitation for the Quad summit to be held in India next year. "I am confident that in the times to come, the partnership between India and Australia will touch new heights and will become a force for the global good," he said.

According to the joint statement, the two leaders observed that 'Make in India' and 'Future Made in Australia' have complementarity and collaborative potential and could help create new jobs, unlock economic growth and secure our future prosperity in a changing world.

"The leaders called for greater two-way investments reflective of the Comprehensive Strategic Partnership and instructed officials to explore ways to realise greater synergies between the economies of both the countries," it said. Modi and Albanese reiterated their commitment to support an open, inclusive, stable, peaceful and prosperous Indo-Pacific.

• Bilateral Progress:Both Prime Ministers acknowledged significant progress in strengthening ties across sectors like climate change, renewable energy, trade, investment, defence, education, and people-to-people relations.



## Economic Cooperation:

## African Penguins



- The African penguin became the first penguin species in the world to be listed as critically endangered by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN).
- About: African penguins (Spheniscus demersus)
- It is one of the smallest penguin species, commonly referred to as "jackass" penguins due to their donkey-like braying calls.
   Males are generally slightly larger than their female counterparts.

- African penguins are monogamous, meaning they have one partner throughout their life.
- Characteristics: African penguins can be recognized by the pink patches of skin above their eyes, which are used to regulate body temperature.
- Habitat: They are found only in Namibia and South Africa.
   Their numbers have been declining since the 1800s and at present there are fewer than 20,000 birds left in the wild.

- Threat: Predators, such as Cape fur seals and kelp gulls, rising ocean temperatures, and lack of prey (small fish like sardines and anchovies).
- **Protection:** They have been protected under South Africa's Sea Birds and Seals Protection Act since 1973 (and more recently under the Marine Threatened or Protected Species Regulations since 2017).
  - These laws and regulations ban the capture of penguins or their eggs and any intentional harm done to them.

## Do you know?

- Penguins are a family of 17 to 19 species of birds that live primarily in the Southern Hemisphere.
- They include the tiny blue penguins of Australia and New Zealand, the majestic emperor penguins of Antarctica, and the **Galápagos penguin** (the only penguin to be found north of the equator).
- Although penguins are birds, they have flippers instead of wings and are unable to fly.


