GST officials find Hajmola hard to digest

NEW DELHI

Hajmola candy, a popular product of Dabur and known for digestion, appears to be causing indigestion for tax officials, as the Directorate General of GST Intelligence has initiated an investigation on the issue of classification.

"It is under investigation. A summon has been issued [to the company]. They made certain submissions during the investigation," a senior government official told *businessline*. The issue is whether Hajmola is a normal candy or an Ayurvedic preparation. In the case of a normal candy, the GST will be 18%, while in the case of an Ayurvedic preparation, the rate will be 12%.

When contacted, the company did not respond. However, sources said that a similar issue was raised during the pre-GST re-

gime, when the Supreme Court in 2002 had dismissed an appeal filed by the Commissioner of Central Excise, Chandigarh, against a ruling by the erstwhile CEGAT (Central Custom, Excise & Gold Appellate Tribunal, now known as the Customs Excise and Service Tax Appellate Tribunal or CESTAT).

The CEGAT had reiterated that Hajmola tablets were Ayurvedic medicines.

In another ruling by Allahabad High Court in 2016, when Uttar Pradesh's Commercial Tax Department appealed against a ruling by a tribunal, which held that 'Chyawanprash,' 'Hajmola' and 'Hajmola Candy' are medicines for

the purposes of taxes. The Department challenged the ruling by questioning: "Whether, on the facts and circumstances of the case, the tribunal was legally justified in holding 'Chyawan-prash,' 'Hajmola' and 'Hajmola Candy' to be medicines even though they are not sold in the medical shops but rather in general stores?"

'The licence matters'

The court took note of the tribunal's observation, which stated that all the three products were being manufactured by Dabur India for many years under the licence granted to it by the Ayurvedic and Unani Services under the Drug and Cosmetics Act, 1940.

The tribunal held that any product manufactured under a licence to make a drug, must be deemed to be a a medicine. The court also highlighted the matter of Lal Dant Manjan, which is manufactured based on a licence issued under the Drugs and Cosmetics Act and would be treated as medicine/drugs.

"The place of sale of any product is not a relevant criterion for determining its nature as to whether it is a drug/medicine or an item of general use; rather, the relevant criterion is the license under which such a product is being manufactured, and if the license is for the purposes of manufacturing a drug or medicine under the relevant statute, the product would essentially be a drug/medicine," it said while dismissing the appeal by the tax department.

Meanwhile, Hajmola candy is the latest case of mis-classification after donut. Mumbai-based MOD got a ₹100-crore tax notice from the DGGI for allegedly misclassifying its donuts.

U.S. exempts tech imports from reciprocal tariffs

The move acknowledges the difficulty of shifting electronics manufacturing to the U.S., as most production is concentrated in Asia; these items will not be subject to the 145% tariffs on China

he Trump administration late Friday said they would exclude electronics like smartphones and laptops from reciprocal tariffs, a move that could help keep the prices down for popular consumer electronics that are not usually made in the U.S.

It would also benefit big tech companies like Apple and Samsung and chip makers like Nvidia and sets the stage for a likely tech stock rally on Monday.

U.S. Customs and Border Protection said items like smartphones, laptops, hard drives, flat-panel

monitors and some chips would qualify for the exemption. Machines used to make semiconductors are excluded too. That means they will not be subject to the current 145% tariffs levied on China or the 10% baseline tariffs elsewhere.

It is the latest tariff change by the Trump administration, which has made several U-turns in their massive plan to put tariffs in place on goods from most countries. The exemption seemed to reflect the President's realisation that his China tariffs are unlikely to shift more manufacturing of smartphones, computers and other gadgets to the U.S.

The electronics exemption also should relieve consumer worries that the China tariffs would result in hefty price hikes on smartphones and other devices that have become essential tools of modern living.

The move takes off "a huge black cloud overhang for now over the tech sector and the pressure facing U.S. Big Tech," said Wedbush analyst Dan Ives in a research note.
