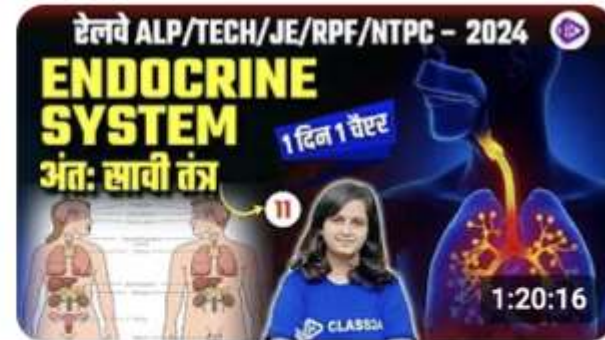

WHAT TRUMP'S TRIUMPH MEANS FOR THE WORLD

What will the next 4 years be like? If he keeps his word, he will depart from several US policy consensuses, and each departure, given America's power, can have major consequences

TRADING TENSIONS: He called himself Mr Tariff in his first term, he wants to be Master Tariff this time. Trump wants a 60% tariff on all Chinese imports into US, and 100% duty on Chinese cars. And he wants all tariffs, applicable to whichever other country is selling goods to US, to be raised to 20%. This is turbocharged protectionism. If Trump goes through with even a part of it, multilateral trade will be hit, because other major economies will raise tariffs. Bilateral trade treaties will gain even more currency

BEIJING WILL GET IT BAD: China was already in Biden administration's crosshairs, with laws denying export of cutting-edge tech. Trump will double down. Some of his advisers want a total decoupling with China. That may be hard to do. But he'll likely push for a more hardline stand, not just on trade but also on what many American conservatives call Chinese 'influence peddling' in America

NO FREE RIDE FOR ZELENSKY: Trump's victory

especially against Iran, which is enemy Number 2 (China's first) for Trump. Whether Trump will stop Bibi from getting madly aggro – targeting Iran's nuclear sites, for example – is the question

CLIMATE CHANGE? THE HEAT'S BACK He's dished everything about climate change all over again, and promised to "drill, baby, drill". He likely won't join any multilateral deal on emission targets. Will he favour hydrocarbons over green tech domestically, especially given US advantage in developing the

latter? Policy wonks will say he won't. Don't bet on them

I'LL DO MY THING, YOU DO YOURS: Trump's unlikely to be preachy about human rights or minority rights in other countries. He's on record saying he doesn't think America should spread its "values". This is good news for some countries. But it's bad news for Nato's Europeans, who may have to finally find leadership among their own, especially vis-à-vis Russia. In Asia, countries like Japan, South Korea, India may have to rely less on American support on strategic matters

Why Trump Won: Decoding The Verdict

Pollsters predicted a cliff-hanger election. Americans gave a thumping verdict for Trump. **TOI** draws on information from our US correspondent and a range of American news sources to identify the factors behind the numbers, beyond the headlines.

■ **IT'S (AGAIN) THE ECONOMY:** CNN put out a US map that tracked wage growth vs inflation rate across all counties. Across the country, **inflation had risen faster than wages**. That's a picture worth a thousand economists' analyses. Never mind that US growth, per latest data, was excellent. **Most ordinary Americans weren't feeling**

good. Nearly **75% felt the country was headed in the wrong direction** and the economy was in bad shape. Trump's promise of hiking tariffs and bringing factories back to US went down well across ethnic groups. And the wealthier voters liked his promise of big tax cuts.

■ **KEEP THEM OUT:** An AP post-poll analysis pointed out **immigration was an issue 5x more important** in 2024 than 2020. Even many Latino voters – the biggest immigrant bloc – shared the sentiment. Per CNN, Trump got **54% of Latino men's vote compared to 36% in 2020**. Immigrants don't want hundreds of thousands co-

ming in, mostly illegally, even if those piling up at the border look like them. It's the 'shut-the-door-behind-me' syndrome. Trump was incendiary on immigration, promising the biggest mass deportation of illegals. It worked across social blocs.

■ **HE'S OUR MAN, SAID MEN:** All post-results exit poll data shows Trump winning the men's vote by 10 points (and losing the women's vote by 10 points). But Trump, unlike Republicans before him in recent elections, won substantial votes from Latino and Black men. An NYT analysis hypothesised that American men liked his 'I don't give a f***' attitude. A Slate

commentator said the result showed "a lot of men" wanted to "reassert their dominance". The Trump campaign also **got less-educated men to vote in large numbers**, in contrast to their usual polling day lethargy. Plus, low-income men reckoned he'd make the economy work for them. Finally, as a CNN analysis showed, **abortion rights weren't a decisive factor**, unlike in 2022 mid-terms. Harris won voters who put abortion high on the agenda by 8 points – but 4 years back, when Roe vs Wade was still in force, Biden had won that group by 38 points.

Rupee trumped, hits fresh all-time low

BETTER POSITIONED THAN ASIAN PEERS

THE RUPEE HIT another all-time low of ₹84.282 against the dollar on Wednesday after the dollar index hit a four-month high. With Donald Trump acing the US presidential race, it is expected that his inflationary policies will lead to further strengthening of the greenback.

The rupee registered a fall of 17 paise in a single day, making it the highest fall in four months. Accord-

ing to the Clearing Corporation of India data, it hit intra-day low of ₹84.33 and closed at ₹84.295 a dollar. According to forex dealers, the rupee may see further decline in the coming days and inch up to ₹84.40.

Despite the all-time low levels, the rupee has fallen the least in comparison to other Asian peers.

Why did Harris fall short of presidential victory

IN A MEETING with one of America's most powerful unions in September at its Washington headquarters, Vice President Kamala Harris said she'd protect union jobs and workers' livelihoods better than Donald Trump.

But leaders of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, long staunchly allied with her Democratic Party, appeared unconvinced. When Harris argued that her Republican rival was no champion of the working class, the union bosses grilled her, questioning whether she and President Joe Biden had done enough for union workers, according to a Teamster leader who recounted the September 16 meeting to *Reuters*. Within days, the union publicly embarrassed Harris by declining to endorse a Democratic presidential candidate for the first time since 1996.

In the wake of Harris' loss of the 2024 presidential election, her tense exchange with union leaders underscores a critical failure of her campaign: connecting with working-class voters anxious about the economy and high prices.

Following Biden's dramatic withdrawal just months before Election Day, Harris threw her campaign together as if it were an airplane being built while in flight, her advisers told reporters. The 60-year-old former prosecutor and US senator pressed a case that Trump was a threat to democracy and women's rights, while promoting a populist economic platform and reproductive freedoms.

Her entrance upended a race that her party had looked set to lose. She made history as the first woman of colour at the top of a major party ticket. She triggered a surge in enthusiasm, broke fundraising records — raising \$1 billion in less than three months — and drew endorsements from celebrities ranging from pop star Taylor Swift to actor and former Califor-

nia governor Arnold Schwarzenegger.

But Harris' campaign ultimately failed to overcome deep-seated voter concerns about inflation and immigra-

tion — twin issues that opinion polls showed favoured Trump. Her loss underscores a profound shift in American politics over the past decade as blue-collar

voters have turned increasingly Republican — a trend Trump appears to have accelerated.

Harris also struggled to counter another Trump-era trend: a torrent of misinformation unprecedented in modern US elections. An avalanche of misrepresentations and falsehoods about her record was spread by the former president and amplified on right-wing websites and media, including conspiracy theories on issues ranging from migrant crime to voter fraud.

When asked by *Reuters* during the race about misinformation amplified by Trump, his campaign officials typically either repeated the falsehoods or did not respond to requests for comment.

By early Wednesday morning, Trump had won 279 electoral votes to Harris' 223, with several states yet to be counted. This account of how Harris lost is based on *Reuters* interviews with Harris campaign staffers, White House officials, Democratic Party advisers and close allies.

It was always going to be a heavy lift. The US has only once elected a president — Barack Obama in 2008 and 2012 — who wasn't a white man. As the daughter of an Indian mother and Jamaican father, Harris had risen higher in the country's leadership than any other woman.


The only other woman to get as close as she did — Hillary Clinton, defeated by Trump in 2016 — staked her candidacy in part on becoming the first female president. In the wake of Clinton's loss, Harris resisted putting her identity at the center of her campaign, said close aides and advisors. Instead, she tried to galvanise voters on issues that mattered to women and Black voters in the election — from abortion rights to middle-class tax cuts and housing affordability.

But those messages struggled to break through at a time when many voters were fixated on rising consumer prices during the first three years of the Biden administration.

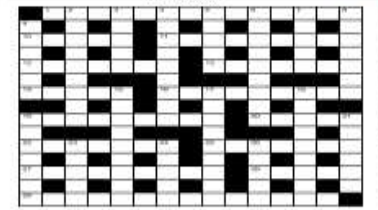

India's palm oil imports soar



Festive splurge: Edible oil demand went robust in festival season, prompting refiners to replenish inventories, say

India's palm oil imports surged 80% in October to a three-month high compared to the previous month, as refiners boosted purchases to replenish stocks depleted by lower-than-usual imports in recent months and strong festive demand, five dealers said.

Higher purchases by the world's biggest vegetable oils importer could lead to lower palm oil stocks in key producers Indonesia and Malaysia, supporting benchmark futures.

Palm oil imports jumped 80% in October from the previous month to 845,000 metric tons, according to estimates from dealers.

Demand for edible oils was robust during the festival season, prompting refiners to replenish their inventories, said Rajesh Patel, managing partner at CSR Research, an edible oil trader. Indians celebrated the Dussehra and Dewali festivals in the last few weeks, increasing the consumption of sweets and fried food.

Palm oil prices were competitive in August when many Indian buyers placed orders, said Sandeep Sharma, CEO of Suniva Group, a vegetable oil brokerage.

Novoil imports in October fell 10% from a month ago to 344,000 metric tons, while sunflower oil imports jumped 57% to 240,000 metric tons, dealers said.

Delayed sunflower oil shipments in September arrived in October, which is reflected in the import numbers, a Mumbai-based dealer said.

The rise in imports of palm oil and sunflower oil lifted the country's total edible oil imports in October by 34% to 1.42 million tons, as per dealers' estimates. India buys palm oil mainly from Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand.

What's at stake for global markets in a Donald Trump presidency?

Mr. Trump's promise of less regulation, lower taxes and more oil production are viewed as positive for equities, but investors have been increasingly worried about the scale of U.S. government debt and Mr. Trump's spending plans could add far more to deficits than what Ms. Harris had proposed

A Donald Trump heads back to the White House, the U.S. dollar and stock market are seen as winners, but a Republican presidency could weigh on bonds, emerging markets, clean energy and sustainable investing.

Here's how:

Currencies
A Trump presidency is seen strengthening the U.S. dollar, with investors expecting his policies to lead to higher inflation and growth than under Democrat Kamala Harris. That will mean the Federal Reserve would need to keep rates high to prevent the economy from overheating, which in turn would be bullish for the dollar.

At the same time, Mr. Trump's plans to impose tariffs on trade, force European allies to pay more for defense and suspend of multilateral institutions are likely to depress growth elsewhere in the world, boosting the dollar's allure.

Oil analysts expect the dollar to rally 3% after a Trump win.

Higher dollar yields will also mean a return of carry trades, with currencies such as the Japanese yen and Swiss franc already heavily sold in the run-up
